

# VOTE IN THE MUNICIPAL ELECTION!

Voting for mayor, city councillors, and members of the school board takes place **October 4th-13th** and **October 15th**.

## Can I vote?

You can vote if...

- You're 18 years old or older (on October 8, 2016)
- You're a Canadian citizen
- You've lived in Nova Scotia for 6 months (since April 7, 2016 or before)
- You live in HRM

## How do I vote?

If you got a voter information letter in the mail, follow the instructions on it to vote on the phone, or on-line between October 4th and 13th, or in person on October 8th, 11th or 15th.

**If you didn't get a voter information letter, you can still vote!** Call 1-844-301-VOTE (8683) or 902-490-VOTE (8683) to have yourself put on the voters' list, and a letter will be mailed to you. Before you do, you can check <https://votersearch.halifax.ca/hrm/onvoterslist.html> to see if you are on the list already. If you are but you haven't received a letter, the person on the phone should be able to tell you how to vote.

## What if I don't have ID?

You do not need to present identification in order to vote in municipal elections.

If you vote in person, and you're not already on the voters' list, you'll need to swear or affirm your name, address, citizenship, residency, and date of birth at the polling station.

If you vote on the phone or on-line, if you haven't already received your voter information letter, call one of the voter information numbers below anytime between October 4 at 8 a.m.-October 13th at 7 p.m for instructions. You'll need to swear or affirm your name, address, citizenship, residency, and date of birth.

## Where do I vote?

It should say where to vote on your voter information letter. If you didn't get one, check the website below or call one of the voter information numbers below.

## What if I'm a student not living at home?

Requirements are the same for students as anyone else. Where you live at election time is where you are eligible to vote, provided you lived in Nova Scotia for 6 months prior to the election.

## Are polling stations accessible?

- All polling stations are mandated to have a level entrance for wheelchair access.
- If you need help to mark your ballot, you can either bring a friend to the polling station or ask the deputy returning officer at the polling station to help you.
- If you are blind or visually impaired, ask the deputy returning officer at the poll to provide the template for visually-impaired voters.
- If you are deaf or hard-of-hearing you can either bring a friend to assist you at the polls or bring a translator.
- If you are without a home and staying at a shelter or with another person, you can vote at the polling location for this residence. At the polling station you can take an affirmation that you are living at a shelter or a residence, along with your name, date of birth, citizenship, and residency in Nova Scotia.
